Preparing for the 2018-2019 Backpack Buddies Program

EFPN will once again coordinate and fund the Backpack Buddies Program. For the school year 2017-2018, approximately 700 children in 11 public elementary schools and 3 preschools received this weekend supplement of food. Children who receive free or reduced price lunches are eligible for the backpack program. Once the program application forms come back, our Backpack Buddies Program coordinator, Debra Ahn, will work with the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan (FBEM) to determine the allotment of items for each school. Items included can be used for breakfast, lunch, dinner, and a snack. There is no cost for children, their families or schools to participate in this program. EFPN also provides a piece of fruit once a month into each backpack. Many schools have switched to plastic grocery bags rather than the backpacks to help control program costs and to ensure that students receive food regardless of whether they remember to return their backpacks on Monday. Many children and their families have come to rely on this extra food for the weekend. It has been shown that children that have adequate food can concentrate on their studies. This past summer we did a backpack program for 210 children at West Midland Family Center, Coleman Elemen-

tary School, Siebert School and North Midland Family Center. For many of these children, the food was offered as an incentive

in a summer reading program.



We are working to expand the program to other low income children in public school preschool classes. Expansion is not just a matter of having the

monetary support, though that is very important, but also having the school personnel and volunteers to implement this program in their schools. The Midland Public Schools transportation garage is near capacity on the amount of food it can accept before it is delivered to the schools. With the addition of more children, we are looking to have a second delivery be made at our warehouse location.

We would not be able to keep this program going without all the volunteers involved, including the staff of all the Midland County schools and community volunteers, and the financial support of many organizations including The James R and Anita Horne Jenkins Foundation, Aldersgate United Methodist Women, Mary Currie Foundation, Charles J. Strosacker Founda-

tion, Community Wishes, Ladies of Blessed Sacrament, First United Methodist Church, Midland Lions Club, Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary Church, Memorial Presbyterian Women and the Midland Kiwanis Foundation as well as many individuals. We are projecting the cost for a backpack this coming year will be around \$137.00 per child which translates to \$96,000 for 700 children.

The BackPack Buddies Program is a testament to many resources coming together to make a difference in the lives of our children. Nelson Mandela said "history will judge us by the difference we make in the everyday lives of children". Food is part of the everyday life for all of us. Thank you for continuing to support our efforts to finance and manage the Backpack Buddies Progra. Your continued support allows EFPN to not only serve our current roster of schools but to expand to more children in

A man wanted to leave his wife for reasons beyond his control. He called to check if we would help him and his children if he needed food. Our coordinator said we would help and he was relieved to know his children would be able to get food.

Remembering Earl Crawford

We were sad to learn of the passing of Earl Crawford. Earl took over running the Sanford Pantry at Sanford United Methodist Church after he retired and was worried about not having enough to do. Along with his wife Kay they were very dedi-



cated in managing the pantry and were great ambassadors for the pantry. Earl developed a great relationship with his local grocery store and other groups in Sanford. These relationships were a great benefit to the Sanford Pantry. Earl often supplemented the EFPN Backpack Buddies Program at Meridian Elementary School with kidfriendly foods that he had secured because of his connections. In looking at statistics on the number of items going out per client, Earl 's pantry numbers often exceeded every other pantry. He cared deeply for his recipients and was very generous. He has been known to deliver food to recipients who could not make it to the pantry. His quick sense of humor often had us laughing. EFPN was blessed to have Earl and Kay be part of our organization.

The Path From Your Donations to Those in Need

Have you wondered how your food donations get into the hands of those in need? A person in need of food contacts EFPN by calling 211 or a local church or agency for a referral or by calling our number directly. Sometimes concerned neighbors, friends or family members alert us to people in need. Many of our recipients hold jobs that are low paying or have few hours and do not have enough money to pay their bills plus

put food on the table. At times an unexpected major expense comes their way including having to take responsibility for younger family members. Sometimes they get ill and do not get paid while off from work. All these calls are channeled to our coordinator who then contacts the recipient. She interviews the recipient to determine the need. We have streamlined the number of questions asked. A lot of the information we obtain is required by USDA or the Food

Bank of Eastern Michigan (FBEM). Sometimes our coordinator reports she can barely hear the person during her interview. They are speaking very softly because they are embarrassed to have to ask for help. Often the stories are very difficult to hear. Our coordinator assigns the person to one of our eight pantries. Our guidelines say that recipients can be helped every two months. However, our coordinator has the discretion to help more often and she often does. Those in our student assistance program are helped monthly.

Some of the hardest working volunteers in our organization are the pantry coordinators and their behind the scene volunteers. They are responsible for making sure the shelves are not only stocked but stocked with a good variety of items. They process donations from the community and purchase food either from the FBEM or local stores. At the end of each month statistics

related to the food inventory and clients served are compiled. They also track churches, organizations or individuals that provided them with food or monetary donations. Our eight pantries give out over 17,000 items /month.

Recipients arrive at the pantry in cars belonging to them, a family member or friend. They also use Dial A Ride, bicycle or walk. Getting to a pantry is sometimes a challenge for many of our

recipients. In addition to pantries with weekday hours, we have a Saturday morning pantry and a Wednesday evening pantry. Over 85% of our clients now go to client select pantries. These pantries allow the recipients to pick out their own food. At client select pantries, the recipients are told to take a weeks worth of food. Often we have recipients who need to be encouraged to take more. We of-

ten hear the reason they do not take enough is because they want to leave food for others. Volunteers will often help them put meals together or give them ideas on cooking various items. We have recipe sheets we developed for a variety of vegetables. If a recipient or a family members has a birthday coming up within the next month or two, they are given a birthday kit. They are also given gift certificates to purchase items we do not have at the pantry-especially certain perishable items. Volunteers often help the people out to their vehicle with their groceries.

We could not provide food for those in need without your support. Because of your generosity, our pantries are well stocked with items that have been donated, purchased from the FBEM or from local stores. Thanks to the many volunteers who help keep our eight pantries running.

EFPN Still Seeks a Permanent Home



The EFPN building committee continues to look for a building to meet the needs of our organization. The building is to be shared with the SAMS Pantry so will need

to be well located in relationship to other EFPN pantries and pantry recipients. EFPN accepts a semi-truck delivery of food every two weeks from the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan as well as deliveries from Hidden Harvest so a large parking lot is needed. We will soon need space to accept some of the food for the Backpack Buddies Program since the Midland Public Schools' transportation garage is at capacity for food pallets it can receive. There are not a lot of buildings available that meet these criteria. Many of the buildings we have looked at in our price range are in need of extensive renovations. Since the last update to our donors, we secured a grant of \$40,000 from the Midland Area Community Foundation and a \$25,000 grant from the Allen Foundation. These are in addition to the \$75,000 grant from the Dow Corning Foundation. Even with the generous support of these foundations as well as individual donors, we still need additional funds to secure and renovate a building. Money that has been designated in the past for food programs will not be used for the building fund. We thank you for your continued support of EFPN and our search for a building that meets the needs of our organization and the future needs of those who are food insecure. Want to help? Partnership with MCFOAR

EFPN has established a number of partnerships. We are able to do this because of your generous asssitance. We provide a box of food at Habitat for Humanity home dedications. We provide nutritional supplements to people referred to us by Cancer Services, Senior Services and DaVita Dialysis. Our homebound senior deliveries go to people referred to us by the Department of Health and Human Services and Senior Services. We stock the pantry at the Academic & Career Education Academy. We have now established a partnership with the Midland Community Former Offenders Advocacy and Rehabilitation (MCFOAR). A volunteer heard a presentation by Rob Worsley in which he describes picking up former offenders when they arrive in Midland. They have very little when they arrive. EFPN is providing them a box of food to help them start their new lives. They also will be told about our pantry network. These boxes are being packed from our pantry at Wheeler Road Church of Christ. MCFOAR has express their gratitude. They said that getting the food is a blessing for their clients. We hope this food not only starts them on the road to recovery but also shows that our community wants them to succeed.

Donate a Deer

EFPN has a partnership with the Chippewa Nature Center. In the fall months, deer that are harvested at the Nature Center are donated to EFPN. EFPN has the deer processed with a licensed processor, and the venison is given to clients.

EFPN also runs a venison program independently of the Chippewa Nature Center program. Deer can be delivered to 784 South Poseyville Road, Midland or we will pick up any deer within a 50 mile radius of Midland. Information or to request a deer pick up can be found at (989) 835-9601. EFPN pays for the processing of the donated deer. We are grateful to the Chippewa Nature Center and their hunters as well as other hunters for providing venison for our clients.
